SUMMER READING PROGRAM

Every year, as schools are preparing to let out for the summer, the library prepares to help our town's students maintain their reading skills and avoid the "summer slide," a decline in reading ability and other academic skills over the summer months. Numerous studies show that kids who don't read during their summer vacations experience a decline in reading ability by the time they return to school in the fall.

Since 1987, the Collaborative Summer Reading Program has established suggested themes for each year's program. This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Apollo 11 moon landing, and the theme is "A Universe of Stories." At the Library, we've brought back the popular Read & Bead program rewarding readers for every 15 minutes of book time with a colorful, glow-in-the-dark, or sparkly bead to add to a necklace they receive at the beginning of the summer. We held a series of Yum-Yum Story Hours on Mondays in July, featuring a story and a space-themed creative food activity, and Outer Space Story Hours on Mondays and Thursdays in August.

Other special events planned for July and August include: The Night Sky presented by the Museum of Science, Boston, with an inflatable planetarium in Goff Hall, author visits for special story times, Martial Arts basics, three Aerospace Camps, Balloon Aliens creation, constructing Alien Ants, Mr. Vinny's Bubble Show, learning about owl calls, habitats, and habits, creating Galaxy Necklaces, Fiona the Whale and whale activities, crafts, facts, and a new story read by the author, and Rockets & Airplanes with Ed the Wizard. We've also trained new families to use our lending telescope so they can explore the universe from their own backyards.

The 135th Annual Meeting of the Rehoboth Antiquarian Society took place on May 1, 2019, preceded by a potluck dinner and a brief talk by Bev Baker of the Rehoboth Cemetery Commission. It was a pleasant social occasion, and also an opportunity to reflect on the past year. I'd love to hear your ideas for the future as well.

Our Society had a float in Rehoboth's 375th anniversary parade, of which our President Emeritus E. Otis Dyer was Grand Marshal. The annual Library Book Sale, Strawberry Festival, and Folk Art and Artisans Show were all successful, and the Arts in the Village concert series drew record crowds. The Rehoboth Cultural Council and the Bristol County Savings Bank Charitable Foundation have supported several of our programs, and we have worked extensively with the Rehoboth public schools. Palmer River School's third-graders paid their annual visits to the colonial kitchen and the herb garden this spring, and this year's scholarship recipient is Michaela Rennick.

Improvements to the buildings continue, although never as rapidly as one would like. Thanks to a generous donation from the Robert D. Wray Charitable Trust, some significant repairs have been made to all of the buildings, the long-awaited concrete walkway to the lower level of Goff Hall is in place, and this summer should bring repainting of trim and some landscaping.

As always, the Blanding Library's programs have benefitted the entire town and we could not wish for better representatives than the dedicated staff at the Library and also at the Carpenter Museum. There were some changes of personnel there: Debbie D'Isabel joined us as Assistant Director, and a new Museum Director, Danielle DiGiacomo, arrived this spring. We are grateful to the Museum staff for the smoothness of these transitions. Danielle brings important collections-care experience, and Debbie is turning her notable talents to improving communication with members. I hope you are all enjoying the newsletters.

I also hope you'll find yourselves inspired to enjoy active roles as members, perhaps as a committee member or as a volunteer for one of our events. Please contact me if you would like more information. WHAT IS IT?

This is the Lewis Tavern or Anawan House or Anawan Inn, located at the intersection of Routes 118 an 44. The (Isaac) Lewis Tavern was built circa 1730. By the 1850's it was known as Anawan House. It was at one time or another a stagecoach stop, tavern, hotel, and meeting place for the Union Baptist Church. It also housed a store and ballroom. It was demolished on February 1,1971. Today a gas station stands in its place.

Anawan Stables can be seen in the far right corner where carriages and horses of the Anawan House clientele were secured. Later in the 20th century it was a public riding stable with paths into the countryside. Today, a strip mall housing Dunkin' Donuts and other shops stand in its place.

UPDATE: CIVIL WAR VETERAN ALEXANDER WILLIAMS

Reverend George Tilton's book <u>A History of Rehoboth MA</u> gave us our first hint that Alexander Williams, a "colored Civil War soldier" who once lived in Rehoboth, is buried at Hix Cemetery, RHC #27. Town records show Alexander lived in Rehoboth and died at the Alms House on October 14,1888. The Cemetery Commission found that Alexander Williams had no grave marker and no flag to honor his service. The town's Veterans Services Officer and Graves Officer applied for a grave marker based on the record of service provided by the National Archives. The records sent showed that Alexander Williams was part of the MA 54th Company A. The stone was received and set at the cemetery in November 2018.

In doing further research on his widow, Catherine Mack, it was discovered the National Archives gave us the wrong records! Catherine applied for a Widow's Pension shortly after her husband died. In her statement to the Navy, she describes her ordeal of taking care of Alexander at the Rehoboth Alms house every day up until he was dead and buried, and how he was in the NAVY assigned to the ship USS Mahaska from 1864 to 1867. She needed to prove her case to the powers that be. She sent them statements which included proof of their marriage, proof of her husband's death, proof he was at the Alms House in Rehoboth, a statement from the Navy of his service, and statements of several ordinary citizens who had known her for years to be an honest person. It took her about a year to obtain the necessary documentation before she received her pension of \$8 per month. By this time, 1890, she was in poor health herself. She died in Lakeville or Berkeley on December 1, 1894.

There are no Navy records found to date for Alexander Williams, other than those from Catherine's Widow's Pension application. His stone which was set in place last November, will be corrected to read "NAVY USS MAHASKA". His service in the Civil War was as a Sailor, just like George H. Tilton had written in his book.

As for the other Alexander Williams of the MA 54th, he died on July 5, 1911 in Boston and is buried at Mt. Hope Cemetery in Mattapan, MA. His grave is marked with a Veteran's stone.

A Graveside Memorial Service for our Alexander Williams, Civil War Sailor, is planned for Sunday, September 22 at 1 pm followed by a gathering at the Carpenter Museum.

BLANDING LIBRARY BOOK REVIEW.



INTERNATIONAL BESTSELLER

Meghan Sullivan-Silva shares this review of Circe by Madeline Miller.

The enchantress Circe is usually remembered for her minor role in Homer's The Odyssey. Her encounter with the hero Odysseus began when he and his crew landed on her island but her appearance in the narrative is brief and one-sided. Madeline Miller's Circe seeks to rectify this oversight. Circe's lonely childhood is explored, with various familiar immortals flitting in and out of the story. Ultimately recognized as a great sorceress, Circe came to her power through a slow and painful process. She was cast out from her home and banished to the island where she would someday play host to Odysseus, from there witnessing the lives of mortals and gods play out while honing her skills. Miller's beautiful retelling of this small chapter of the Odyssey lends depth and humanity to characters that are otherwise forgotten. This book is an enjoyable adaptation for those already familiar with Homer's work, and a lovely introduction to the rich world of Greek mythology for those who aren't. An easy read that remains engaging throughout, this is the perfect book to pick up this summer.
