

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

This is an interesting time for educational organizations like ours. We value our work preserving Rehoboth's history and providing information access to everyone. Recent Federal funding cuts to museum and library services threaten to affect the ways in which we are able to serve the public. Although the Institute of Museum and Library Services has had a budget of only 0.0046% of the overall federal budget, it has provided invaluable support for the regional services on which we rely; these services are now threatened.

The Rehoboth Antiquarian Society is proud to operate the Blanding Public Library and the Carpenter Museum and to welcome both townspeople and visitors who come for pleasure and research. Along with access to our own collections, we offer a wide variety of educational programming for all ages throughout the year, museum passes, e-books, newspapers, scholarships, summer reading materials for local schools, field trips, and cultural events, as well as wifi connections and computer access for those who may not have them at home. Through the SAILS network, Rehoboth residents have access to books and other materials from the entire Commonwealth and beyond, research databases, language learning programs, and more.

Much of this is supported by regional library and museum networks which are supported by the IMLS. Please let your legislators know what libraries and museums mean to you.

BOARD MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: LAURA CLERX

We continue our seasonal board member spotlight with our newest member, Laura Clerx!

How long have you been a RAS board member and what drew you to become one?

My appointment as an RAS board member was just recently made official at the annual membership meeting on May 7th! Two summers ago, I had the opportunity to work as the Carpenter Museum's "community programs and education" intern. I'm currently completing my PhD in early American history, so the opportunity to bring some of this history to life in the context of my own community was very exciting to me. RAS members are doing great work to uncover our local pasts, and I'm thrilled to further and deepen my connection to this community as a member of the board of trustees.

How long have you lived in the area?

I have lived in Seekonk (Old Rehoboth) nearly my entire life! My family moved here from East Providence shortly after I was born. Apart from a few years in Cambridge, MA, for school, I have lived here for most of my adult life as well.

What do you like most about living in this community?

When I was growing up, my mom would often point out things me some of the that make to our Seekonk/Rehoboth community special: the stone walls running through woods and neighborhoods - reminders of an agricultural past (including land that was once farmed by my grandfather's Azorean immigrant family in nearby Rhode Island!); the Native American history that continues to surround us; the one-room Hornbine school house where I was able to visit and speak with Frances Magan Jones about my history research; and the active slate of contra dances, concerts, and more taking place at the Blanding Library.

In addition to spending a great deal of time in a 4-H club on a friend's Rehoboth dairy goat farm as a child, I found that the RAS offered the surrounding community many wonderful opportunities to learn, meet others, and have fun.

What is something you wish more people knew about living in Seekonk and being involved in the RAS?

I wish that people living in the towns and cities surrounding Rehoboth (including Seekonk, East Providence, Attleboro, and more!) knew that these areas were once part of "Old Rehoboth" and therefore have a shared history. This shared history makes the RAS relevant to those living in a fairly broad geographic area of southeastern Massachusetts. I wish more people knew about the resource that the RAS can be to them as they learn about the history of their local surroundings!

What is a wish you have for the future of Seekonk / Rehoboth?

We learn to love things (people, but also places!) by coming to know more about them. My wish for the future of Seekonk/Rehoboth is that more people are made aware of and come to see organizations like the RAS as an accessible and enriching community resource. I hope that Greater Rehoboth residents and their families will find the RAS to be a means of connection to their local community, as well as a place to turn to for education and learning. I think people will envision the future of our towns more creatively, if they are able to experience, as I did, the many ways they are connected to it, past and present.
