We spent September continuing our 250th American Revolutionary War celebrations with Rehoboth and its Veterans in the American Revolution: A Carpenter Museum Symposium. We were impressed by all of the fantastic conversations during the day. We were joined by Keynote speaker Robert A. Geake and Hank Coleman, and many lovely local historical and cultural organizations. We want to thank The Mass Cultural Council and all of the volunteers.

As part of this event we also installed Rehoboth in the Revolution. If you haven't yet seen the display, the posters are up throughout the museum and barn, including the list of Rehoboth Veterans. Was one of your family members involved? Then they might just be up on our wall so come by to learn more about Rehoboth's involvement in the Revolutionary War.


In between all of our events we also put in a new exhibit, Woven Histories: The Art and Labor of Early American Textiles. Fiber arts is a continuous and important thread throughout human history and one that we want to highlight during the next couple years. Within this exhibit we look at the local, and larger, ways in which fiber arts have impacted and been impacted by Rehoboth residents.





A perfect tie-in to the new exhibit is the October 9th lecture by Professor Seth Rockman from Brown University. Rock man will be at the Museum at 6:30pm to talk about his newest book, *Plantation Goods: A Material History of American Slavery*. In this talk Rockman tells the biggest stories of early American history through the most mundane artifacts. In following these goods from the communities in which they were made to the communities in which they were used, Rockman rethinks the geography of slavery and freedom in the decades between American independence and the Civil War. Registration is recommended.





We are also hosting our annual Crafter's Marketplace on October 18th from 9:00am-3:00pm! This prestigious show has dozens of vendors selling their wares to raise money to support Museum projects and programming. This show is committed to bringing quality handmade items from skilled crafters to their shoppers. The Marketplace is free to enter, free to park, and makes the perfect autumn outing. We will also be running a children's Papermaking Workshop with Blanding Library on November 22! Join us to learn about this history of paper making and get a chance
